
## **Bridge with Richard Ward**

West is in -1100 territory with that 3S bid but, when South bids 3NT, North shows a bit extra with a quantitative 4NT (quantitative, not ace-asking). South needs no further encouragement, opting for what he hopes will be a safer contract than 6NT – wrong! When West starts proceedings with the ten of hearts, South's singleton-detector nose twitches. This is the only lead which jeopardises the contract as, without it, declarer can simply lose a trick to whoever holds the queen of clubs and then claim twelve tricks. How irritating!

However, there is a fool-proof winning line available which does not require a successful guess in clubs. Win the ace of hearts, draw trumps in three rounds and then play off the three spade winners throwing a heart from dummy. Now play the remaining heart to East's king. He will be forced to either play a heart allowing South to throw a club loser whilst ruffing in dummy or a club which eliminates the guess. Finding this endplay is easy enough but it is possible to have a blind spot about the need to discard a heart from dummy.
