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In our match, we had the normal auction to the par spot of 2♥x. South was missing the ace of spades so opened the mainstream weak notrump, and James Coutts was lured into balancing with a Landy 2♣ for the majors.

North-South quickly sniffed out that the hand did, in fact, belong to them and demanded their pound of flesh. Kowalczyk cashed a spade before switching to trumps. This displeased Belonogov, who won and returned a club. Coutts played a spade which Kowalczyk won to return another trump. Now Coutts could make three hearts, one ruff and two clubs for down two and a paltry -300. This won 4 imps against 3NT at the other table, but this is not really the point of the story.

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David Gue and Bec O'Reilly meandered their way to 6NT. Deep Finesse says this is cold, but Gue, the reigning titleholder of the 2022 Loose Moose Goose of the Day Award, was not convinced.

A spade was led to the queen, and Gue advanced a heart to the king, dropping the jack. Making 6NT now is as simple as playing three rounds of diamonds. East wins their queen but has no heart to play. Declarer throws all their hearts on the diamonds and take the club finesse at end. Gue opted instead for a safe line to go one down, as did the two other declarers in 6NT.

Did anyone make slam? Of course. It is cold. Well, not the 6♦ that Maurits van der Vlught and Marshall Lewis reached, but Justin Mill selected a sneaky low heart for his opening lead and that was +920.

Nabil Edgtton was quite happy to venture 5♣ when partner supported clubs. A little perplexed when the opponents, who had previously limited themselves to a partscore, decided to bid five over five, he doubled. East started shaking his head as Nabil led the ace of diamonds.

Dummy was a disappointment to everyone but declarer. Try as he might, Nabil could not find a way to defeat 5♠ doubled. As Shilling racked up his +650, he ruefully commented, "Usually my sacrifices never work". Indeed, as the best form of sacrifice are the ones that make!

Andy Hung was in a tough spot over 5♣. Not wanting to introduce a ragged four-card suit, Andy passed. Tony had no such qualms and got the hearts in there. Andy had extras and more and raised to the six-level.

Tony played it nicely for ten tricks and a quiet two down to lose a quiet 13 imps.

To Australian Women's team representative player Susan Humphries, it sounded like the opponents were running without the football. Unfortunately for Susan, George Kozakos could firmly see the football in his own hand and sent it back – "return to sender".

The play was brief and painful: ace of spades, ace of hearts and another heart. Declarer ruffed a club and with clubs breaking, that was that for NS -880 and losing 9imps against teammates excellent +500 vs 2NTx.

Liam Milne judged well to only bid 2NT when many would have bid more. As we will see, his good judgement was to be short-lived.

Liz Adams led a diamond around to the 9. Milne wished to establish three spades, one heart and two diamonds to 'escape' for two down, but the problem with playing a top spade then a low spade is that West will have the chance to signal for a heart switch.

Judging that Adams would never have opened a weak 2♠ without an honour, Milne tried a low spade to the ten. Losing to the queen cost both a spade trick and the chance to establish a diamond trick, turning -200 into -800 with his first play of the match.

Normally auctions are presented in a way that is easy for the reader to absorb at a glance. We will not be doing that for this board. Instead, take the North cards and follow along.

Playing a strong 1NT, you are required to find a call as dealer, vulnerable against not. What does a strong 1NT mean to you? Are you a point purist, requiring 15-17 certifiable High Card Points insured by Lloyds of London? Whatever philosophy you subscribe to, Jimmi Wallis showed some belief in the standards of a strong 1NT by opening 1♣. He awaited further developments.

His left-hand opponent looked at her balanced 10-count and passed.

His centre-hand opponent looked at his motley 5-count and passed.

His right-hand opponent looked at his balanced 11-count and passed.

"Well," Jimmi thought, "at least I have five trumps."

Bill Nash tabled his dummy, and the only conclusion the reader may draw is that Bill is in fact a points purist, requiring 6 certifiable High Card Points to respond.

The lead was a heart. Jimmi bested West's 10 with his Ace and set to work.

Trump. Heart to the 9. Trump. Heart to the Ace. Trump. Spade to the King. Trump. Fourth heart, trumped in North with the last trump in the deck. This was the position with declarer (North) on lead:

Try as they might, the defenders could not prevent Jimmi from taking two tricks. He had successfully navigated the excellent breaks and working finesses, the chief of which was the opponents' trumps splitting 4-4, and he had racked up his 7 tricks for a mighty +70.

Let it not be said that those same excellent breaks and working finesses could lead to 11 tricks in 5♦, bid and made only by Bec O'Reilly and David Gue. But in case you weren't aware by now, today's articles are focused upon something other than excellence.



Yesterday's hand came from board 1 of the Friday night walk-in and really gave some of the players a challenge.

Nick Jacob delivered a fantastic celebrity speaker talk on looking after partner at lunch time yesterday and then offered his thoughts on the following hand.

♠ 4

♥ A765

♦ 92

♣ AKJ762

### Partner opens 1♦:

This is a common trap! If you call hearts now and then clubs later partner will have the wrong idea and think that you have more hearts than clubs. Although you only have 12 points, this is a hand that should be considered as worthy of pushing to game if partner opens the bidding. With such a strong hand, you know that you have the time to give partner a clear picture. You should call 2♣ now with the plan to explore hearts later.

### Partner opens 1♣:

Even if you have an inverted minor suit raise, now is not the time to use it. Reply with 1♥ and explore the major fit first. If partner doesn't raise hearts, you might find out more about their hand to help you along the way of working out if 3NT might be a good place to settle or if clubs is the place to be. If partner doesn't have a minimum balanced hand, a club slam might even be possible.

### Opps open 3♠:

What a challenge, you don't want to bid 4♣ because that has taken the bidding past 3NT and also means that finding a 4-4 heart fit will be almost impossible. Double with a hand like this. There will be sometimes when partner bids diamonds and you are a little embarrassed about your dummy (and it might be a disaster) but the upsides of keeping 3NT in play if partner has a spade stopper or 4♥ when there is a fit are worth it. If you considered passing, it's always important to remember that when an opponent pre-empts, you should stretch to make a call if you are the player with shortage in their suit. If you don't, you will miss game far too often.

## DEFENCE IN DETAIL

Liam Milne



Back again in 2022, Defence in Detail looks at real-life hands from the last six months with a focus on practical plays, counting the hand and logical thinking. These deals are designed to be solvable, so put on your thinking hat and play along as we defend the hand together.

When the layout is not fully clear, think about what line of defence your partner has chosen. That will often give you the clue to the winning play.

Playing in an international teams match, you sit East and pick up this collection:

♠ K 2   ♥ 4   ♦ K 8 6 5   ♣ J 9 7 6 5 3

While you take no part in the auction, partner ventures a 1♠ overcall but the opponents sweep this aside to reach 4♥.

Your partner leads the diamond jack and a decent dummy is revealed:

Dummy wins the ♦A at trick one as you encourage partner's lead. Declarer's next play is to cash the ace and king of clubs, dropping his singleton ♣Q then discarding a spade.

Now comes the expected trump which goes to declarer's queen and partner's king.

Partner continues with the ♦9 to your ♦K. What's going on and what's your play?

One near certainty is that you need a spade trick to beat this contract, and that given declarer's haste to discard a spade, you likely have a trick in the suit. You think you can probably cash the ♠K and see no reason not to; declarer follows with the ♠10 and partner contributes the ♠9, discouraging.

What now – try a club for a trump promotion, or something else?

### Solution:

It feels natural to play a club which partner and declarer are both out of. This will promote a trump trick if partner has at least ♥10-x remaining. A second spade is out – partner's ♠9 plus declarer's early rush to discard spades shows us that declarer has no more spades left.

What about a diamond? This is less intuitive, but if partner is out of diamonds and has a heart higher than dummy's ♥8 you might be able to promote a trick in a different way.

What's the clue? It all boils down to counting the hand and partner's defence. Partner's diamond lead and later continuation of the ♦9 (not the 10) looks like a doubleton, and declarer being short in spades and clubs makes them likely to hold a diamond side suit.

Partner's second diamond play, then their strong ♠9 signal, looks like they have a plan to set up a ruff. You should trust partner's defence and signal and play a diamond rather than a club, needing only the ♥9 or higher with partner to succeed.

A diamond works but a club does not, as the full hand looks like this:

If you play a club, declarer's trumps are strong enough to ruff high and draw trumps, but if you play a diamond partner can ruff with the ♥9 in front of dummy to beat the contract. Remember to congratulate partner on their fine lead.

**Point to remember:** Relying on general themes of defence is one thing, but trusting partner's line of play and signals is more important. Doing the 'normal' thing solves a lot of easy hands, but the hard hands require extra care and trust.

When dummy has a singleton, a recommended approach if partner leads the ace of that suit is to give a suit-preference signal. It makes little sense for East's ♥10 at trick 2 to be an encourage / discourage signal. Instead, it can be useful to treat the card as suit-preference.

In this case, the ♥10 would be suit-preference for the higher non-trump suit, diamonds. Despite South's ♦J at trick 1, West should trust partner and play the ♦K at trick 3. This wins and West can then give East a diamond ruff. Declarer has to lose a club later for one down.

At the table West switched to the ♣Q at trick 3. South won, drew trumps and played a low club from dummy. East won and returned a heart, ruffed in dummy. Then came the ♣J, king,

ruffed. South played a diamond and West's ♦K was the last trick for the defence, North-South +140.

Zephyr Education Inc is the charity the Gold Coast Congress and Qld Bridge Association are supporting again in 2022. Zephyr provides the full educational needs of children affected by domestic violence in 110+ Qld shelters and family support organisations, all 7 DV shelters in Tasmania and 16 at present in Western Australia.

Zephyr is run completely by volunteers and no one is reimbursed for personal expenses - let alone paid a wage. No rent is paid for premises and overheads are minimal, so virtually all money donated by you is spent helping these vulnerable children fit in and be given the opportunity of a full education. We receive no government funding.

Last financial year Zephyr approved requests to assist more than 3000 children. Our funding needs have grown every year in line with our expanding work. On average, it costs around \$4000 to support the educational needs of children in one shelter over the course of a year. In the 2020-2021 financial year, the total cost of all items of expenditure was \$467,956, an increase of 19.2% from the previous year. Zephyr has been called a 'game changer' in the sector.






