South's 'splinter' 4C bid showed a singleton or void club (not usually the ace) and North, seeing no wastage in clubs, a fourth trump and two prime honours outside clubs and hearts took the plunge to slam. Fortune favours the brave. West started with the jack of spades won with the king and, when trumps did not break 2-2, declarer conceded one down saying "There's nothing I can do about it. I must lose a spade and a heart." Actually, there was something to do, and that was to play out the hand in the hope that the defensive spade trick and West's heart trick would fall together at trick 13. The plan is to ruff three clubs, hoping that West started with four clubs: king of diamonds; ruff a club; ace of diamonds and a diamond ruff; ruff a club; cross to the ace of spades and ruff the last club. The last two tricks have South holding a spade and a trump leading a diamond towards dummy's small spade and heart. Check it out. It's magic.
