
Bridge with Richard Ward

A competent declarer can usually tell when the opponents are angling for a defensive ruff. The routine counter to this is to draw as many trumps as quickly as possible. On this hand, North-South bid accurately to six spades played by South on the lead of the five of diamonds.

NORTH	SOUTH
♠ Q854	♠ AJ106
♥ A K	Q 2
• Q 10	AK632
♣ AQ1096	. K5

Declarer played the queen of diamonds initially, planning to be in dummy to take the spade finesse(s) and was a bit surprised when the jack appeared from East. The danger of a diamond ruff should the finesse fail was obvious and so next came ace and another spade won by East who gave his partner a ruff for the setting trick! The look on South's face must have been priceless! The whole hand:



East was Sweden's Peter Fredin about whom a book has been written: "Master of Bridge Psychology: Inside the Remarkable Mind of Peter Fredin". We lesser players can only look on with awe. At the other table, there was a bidding mix-up and seven spades was reached. So, when the spade finesse worked, that was plus 1510 and 17 imps to the Fredin team.
