When the diamond fit was disclosed, North and South used cue bidding on their way to the small slam. West led the club king. A useful dummy tracked and declarer's initial analysis was that a 3-3 spade break would provide three heart discards and, failing that, there was a last-chance heart finesse to take. It is easy to miss an extra possibility and our bridge column declarer found it.

After drawing two rounds of trumps with the king and queen, declarer led the two of spades towards dummy. If West rose with the ace, declarer would have four spade tricks, so West played low and dummy's king won the trick. A low spade was then played from dummy to declarer's jack and West's ace. This left West on lead with only clubs and hearts: eventually he exited with a club. Declarer ruffed this in dummy and threw a heart from hand. After cashing the queen of spades, throwing a second heart from hand, declarer ruffed a spade to establish a spade trick in dummy. Then he could cross back to dummy with a diamond and discard his jack of hearts on dummy's spade winner. What a cunning devil!
