
Bridge with Richard Ward

There are so many different aspects to think about in this game that sometimes just evaluating your hand, following suit, counting trumps and signalling (legally) to partner in defence takes up all of your energy. If you become competent at all of these things you will, by and large, find yourself on the podium now and again. This hand happens to be 'cold' for ten tricks but, even seeing all four hands, the successful line is not obvious.



North's double was a 'support double' promising three hearts so South bid to the normal game. West started with the king of spades and our genius declarer was reasonably confident that the ace of clubs was with West given the bidding. So the opening lead was ducked and the ten of diamonds switch was taken by the ace. Then - here comes the 'genius' bit - a low spade went to the jack and queen. Later, the diamond loser was discarded on the ace of spades and it was then easy to establish diamond winners to make one spade, five hearts and four diamonds. It would not have helped West to continue with the queen of spades at trick two as that would have been ducked leading to the same result. There were distributional dangers to this line but this was far better than hoping for the ace of clubs onside.
