
Bridge with Richard Ward

You are North holding **S** KJ1032 **H** 73 **D** K3 **C** 8652 This has been the bidding:

WEST	NORTH	EAST	SOUTH

On lead you try the king of diamonds. Dummy tracks with $\bf S$ Q4 $\, \bf H$ Q9654 $\, \bf D$ 5 $\, \bf C$ KQ743 and the singleton diamond is a disappointment. Clearly you want to prevent declarer's diamond ruffs and you know from the bidding that partner has no spades, so how to proceed? The solution is logical and findable. Play the king of spades at trick 2! - a low spade will not be as effective. On the king play, declarer can win the ace, but, if a diamond is ruffed with dummy's queen, the trump trick the defenders seemingly gave up would come back. On a low spade switch, declarer could put up the queen, ruff out the ace of clubs, then ruff a diamond low and take a discard on the queen of clubs to finish just two down for -300. The king of spades play collects 500.
